

### Introduction

In 2024, the EPA published our landmark four-year assessment of the State of Ireland's Environment. The report highlights the progress that Ireland has made since joining the EU over 50 years ago, however future prosperity and health are threatened unless we better protect our environment. Where we are currently, while it is better, is nowhere near good enough. We are always playing catch-up. We now have virtually no seriously polluted rivers, but we have hardly any pristine ones left



either. We now recycle more but produce more waste than ever and export much of it. We are taking positive actions across multiple fronts, but they are not keeping pace with the growing pressures, and our environment is being squeezed. Incremental change is not the best use of scarce time and resources. We need to make a fundamental shift.

Whilst some welcome progress is being made on climate action, we are still well off-track from meeting our 2030 targets. Critically, however, this level of delivery is not evident across other areas of the environment. The report shows that across five key environmental indicators, none were rated good or very good. Indeed, for air, water, climate, nature, and waste indicators, Ireland scored moderate, poor, or very poor. We need to build momentum towards delivering not only on climate but also on our water, circular economy, pollution reduction, and biodiversity goals. Delivering on these aims will require transformational change in many of the core systems of our society, and will involve everyone. We have much to do, but by acting now we can make good in providing a healthy, clean and resilient environment for ourselves and future generations.

These highlights of 2024 look back at the work of the EPA over the last 12 months, through regulation, scientific knowledge and working with others. A key priority for the EPA continues to be the provision of timely and targeted information on the environment. In addition to our State of the Environment Report, we published over 50 major reports on water, air, circular economy, environmental compliance and more. During the year we also launched our new series of Quarterly Greenhouse Gas Emissions Reports. These reports aim to support early and more frequent monitoring of progress on Climate Action. The EPA also published an early insights bulletin into nitrogen levels in major rivers in Ireland for the period January to June 2024. In 2025, the EPA will continue to use our expertise, extensive monitoring systems, evidence and research to protect, improve, and restore Ireland's environment.
